The PAI major reviews significant international issues while focusing on the nature of, and prospects for, peace in today's world. The combination of a basic introduction to international issues and peace studies encourages both intellectual understanding of, and active participation in, the contemporary global community. The PAI major supplements other Rockhurst major programs, providing the context in which students may both understand and transform the world around them. This interdisciplinary major is grounded in history, with additional emphases on foreign language, intercultural communication, cultural encounters, business and economics, and the moral/ethical bases of global communities.
