Specific Population Characteristics to be served:

This major aims to support student interest in the area of social issue advocacy. The literature on Generation Z indicates a heightened interest in issues such as social justice, environmental protection, race relations, wage inequality, voting rights, and a host of issues that impact society. This generation is more racially diverse than any of its predecessors and members of the generation are very interested in issues related to diversity, equity, and inclusion. It is believed that this major will have a strong appeal to students who seek careers in non-profits, as community organizers, as issue advocates, and the like.

The courses for this program are interdisciplinary. As a result, faculty will be drawn from the constituent departments of the program and meet the professional requirements of their individual discipline.
