Both MU and UMSL will be responsible for providing these services to students, based on the institution the student chooses at their home institution. Missouri Online will also provide some support at the system-level.

Given both MU and UMSL operate within the University of Missouri System, their academic calendars are closely aligned. The Governance Committee outlined in the MOU, with support from the registrars that have been closely engaged in the development of this proposal, are charged with working through any issues pertaining to the academic calendar.



Memorandum of Understanding

100% Online Joint B.A. in Psychology (MU/UMSL)

Overview and Purpose

This agreement is made between Missouri Online | Office of eLearning and University of Missouri – Columbia (MU) and the University of Missouri – St. Louis (UMSL) for the joint development, marketing, delivery, and maintenance of a fully online baccalaureate program in psychology.

By promoting cooperation between MU and UMSL's Psychology departments, course offerings for undergraduate students are expanded, increasing flexible pathways to degree completion in alignment with the Missouri Compact for Student Success. This program is intended to attract and serve a new population of students, while continuing to provide the high-quality, face-to-face programs in psychological sciences offered separately by both institutions.

Term

It is mutually understood that this agreement shall become effective July 1, 2022 and remain in effect until June 30, 2024. This agreement may be modified at any time by mutual written consent of both parties. The terms of this agreement will be reviewed at the end of three years using the following analysis points:

- SCH distribution between MU and UMSL
- Distribution of course offerings between MU and UMSL
- Revenue generation and distribution between MU and UMSL
- Total number of degrees awarded
- Online program growth relative to historical growth and growth of on-ground programs

The remainder of this document describes specific general requirements to be fulfilled by students admitted to the Joint Cooperative Program. The Appendix contains a summary of the degree requirements and any updated agreements.

Guiding Principles

The following principles will guide this collaborative degree program:

- **Student Focused**: Provide students with flexible options, with a larger catalog of courses than either MU or UMSL can offer independently.
- Collaboration: Enhance the collaborative relationship between MU and UMSL's
 departments of psychological sciences, with both having an equal say in the
 management and delivery of the program and both sharing in subsequent success of the
 program
- Consistency: Course-level outcomes and quality will remain the same across institutions and instructors, providing students with a reliable and high-quality experience
- Do No Harm: The new degree offering should not compete with MU and UMSL's existing on-ground psychology offerings

Program Overview and Administration

This document contains a description of and guidelines governing the MU/UMSL joint B.A. in Psychology intended to allow undergraduate students to obtain a B.A. degree in Psychology while performing their undergraduate course work at both universities. The program is slated to be approved by the Coordinating Board for Higher Education in Summer 2022 and, pending appropriate approvals, may award its first joint degree during Academic Year 2022-2023. The approval of the joint online BA in Psychology will coincide with the re-naming of the existing oncampus programs, which will be titled Psychological Sciences, as well as the removal of 100% online modalities for those programs. The primary goal of the program is to take advantage of the combined expertise of the faculty in the MU Department of Psychological Sciences and in the UMSL Department of Psychological Sciences.

Students admitted to the joint BA program will apply to either MU or UMSL and must meet the admission requirement for that university. Students admitted to either institution will be able to take online courses offered by either university through intercampus course sharing. Seats in courses associated with the joint degree program will be made available to students in the oncampus programs as program policies and resources allow.

The joint BA degree is granted by the University of Missouri Board of Curators, with the diploma will be signed by the MU President and the UMSL Chancellor. Graduating students will participate in the commencement exercises of their home institution (i.e., the university to which they applied and were accepted). Aside from the aforementioned details, all standard elements of a diploma for the student's home institution shall be used for the purposes of a student graduating from the joint degree program.

Governance Committee

A Program Governance Committee, consisting of department chairs, program directors, and other relevant stakeholders will oversee administration of the joint program, including enrollment policies, curricular offerings, cost and resource sharing, and program outcomes evaluation. General education courses and any other courses outside of the department that are required for the program will be monitored, coordinated, and offered by the college deans' offices at reasonable intervals.


To help ensure the faculty from both universities own the curricular decisions for this program, a group of faculty members will help to provide oversight. This governance committee will be composed of the following group. This roster will be updated and revised as needed by the committee.

- 1. MU Program Director (will serve as acting committee chair in rotation with UMSL)
- 2. UMSL Program Director (will serve as acting committee chair in rotation with MU)
- 3. MU Psychological Sciences Department Chair
- 4. UMSL Psychological Sciences Department Chair

- 1. MU Advisor
- 2. UMSL Advisor
- 3. MU Business Manager
- 4. UMSL Business Manager
- 5. Alternating Dean or Designee
- 6. Missouri Online Representative
- 7. UM Academic Affairs Representative



- 1. Hold meetings at least once per semester to check in and ensure things are running smoothly. This can include consultation with Undergraduate Deans at each campus to coordinate enrollment in non-psychology courses required for graduation (e.g., general education and college requirements).
- 2. Voting members are appointed by the deans from each university and a Governance Committee Chair is appointed every two years in an UMSL and MU rotation
- 3. Issues that cannot be resolved by the Governance Committee will be referred to the MU and UMSL deans of the appropriate colleges to resolve the issue. Any issue that cannot be resolved at the dean-level will be referred to the provosts, and, further, the UM Office of Academic Affairs and the Council of Chancellors for final resolution.
- Major-specific student academic exemptions or course substitutions will be handled by the chair of the Governance Committee with consultation from the full committee or advisors as needed.
- 5. The committee will address issues of curriculum changes, student waivers, admission requirements, and other academic items as needed.
- 6. Issues governance will handle include any curriculum changes, student waivers, admission requirements, or any other academic items as appropriate.

Intercampus Course Sharing and Reporting

The joint BA program will align with existing intercampus course sharing policies. Student credit hours and overall enrollment numbers for students enrolled in courses shared between the two departments will be counted by the instructor of record, or the department offering the course. The teaching institution will receive 50% of the course revenue for students from a different university enrolled in its course, and 100% of the revenue for students for whom the home and teaching institutions are the same. For example, UMSL will receive 50% of the revenue for MU students enrolled in its courses; and 100% of the revenue for UMSL students enrolled in its courses. The Governance Committee is responsible for determining which courses will be shared outside of the 15-credit-hou core curriculum.

After a period of two years, or four consecutive semesters, this agreement will be reviewed by both university CFOs in collaboration with the Governance Committee and Deans to determine if the course sharing revenue split should be used moving forward. CFOs will annually review SCH/revenue and adjust accordingly if distribution is weighted higher at one campus versus another.

Each department is to be reviewed on its individual merits for university/CBHE program review purposes. To facilitate the five-year review process, individual department reviews for the two departments will be scheduled to occur in the same year of the review cycle whenever feasible. Review of the joint BA program should include information regarding the number of students admitted to the program, the percentage of courses and SCHs offered by each department, the number of degrees granted, the average number of years required to achieve the degree, the

number of faculty from both departments who have participated in the program directly as an instructor, co-advisor, or committee member, as well as any additional evidence of cooperative educational or research activities between the two departments that have occurred as a result of or have been facilitated by the program.

A joint degree program does not require Higher Learning Commission (HLC) approval; however, HLC should be kept well informed when such arrangements are developed, and participating institutions should disclose these arrangements and the processes followed to assure quality in future HLC evaluation documents (e.g., Assurance Arguments). Missouri Online and the UM System Office of Academic Affairs will collect and submit the initial report to HLC on how this joint program was developed.

For purposes of external reporting, departments will report headcount and graduates based on students' home institution in accordance with existing policies and practices. For purpose of internal reporting, in collaboration with the MU and UMSL Registrars, a Cognos report will be prepared each semester to report overall, non-duplicated headcount in the program. As the program matures, the Governance Committee may work with the Registrars to discuss additional data needs and assess feasibility and appropriateness of collecting these data. The Registrars will provide guidance to the departments regarding how these data should and should not be utilized.

Revenue Allocation and Hold Harmless Clause

As students determine the type of program that best suits their needs, it is anticipated that there will be enrollment shifts between the on-ground programs and the joint online program for both departments. To give the joint program a chance to grow and enrollments to naturally settle based on student preference, university administrators will hold the college and departments harmless with respect to budget allocations and other resource supports for shifts in modality and enrollments during the initial two-year period.

- Both college and department level annual budget allocations will not be decreased as a result of perceived drops in student enrollment to the psychology major during the first two years of the program
- Advisors dedicated to the on-ground MU & UMSL psychological sciences programs will
 not be decreased because of perceived drops in student enrollment during the first two
 years of the program
- Departments will not be expected to address increased need for advisor and/or administrative support without additional resource allocation from online program net revenue, Missouri Online, or the university.

Additional investments will be needed for this program to grow. The Deans, CFOs, and Provosts commit to providing the service supports necessary to sustain and meet current and emerging needs of the program.

Supported services include the following:

- Advising (Academic & Departmental)
 - Ensure advising load meets industry standard of 275 students per academic advisor across all programs the advisor is overseeing
- Adjunct/Instructor support
- GTA support
- Marketing support

The revenue will be split based on the course share program, see above. If there are cost escalations, this will be handled by each university through their normal allocation process.

Course Requirements

Unless exempted due to previous undergraduate-level course work, all students in the Joint Cooperative Program are required to take a set of core courses, and electives as described in Appendix A. These courses, to be listed and offered to students of the Joint Cooperative Program, may be revised with the approval of both departments.

Advising

The MU College of Arts and Science will provide initial academic advising support, above advising resources currently provided for the on-campus degrees, with these costs factored into differential campus investment and thus corresponding to different allocation needs, for a period of four semesters or until enrollment reaches a point where additional academic advisors are needed, at which point program net revenues will be used to support an additional advisor.

The UMSL College of Arts and Sciences and the UMSL Office of the Provost will work with the department to assess advising needs and make additional investments in advising as deemed appropriate based on program growth.
