The primary target audience for the MPA program with three concentrations will be full-time, part-time traditional age students, and working adults. The program seeks to serve underserved populations including ethnic minorities and those individuals without access to graduate programs due to financial limitations.

- Fourteen full-time and part- time faculty will be employed in this program. The number and type of
 faculty is sufficient to support the program. The university plans to hire four full-time faculty for the
 graduate program and has budgeted for the expenses of those hires. Moreover, the University plans to
 hire additional full-time faculty as enrollment grows.

Eighty-five percent of the program courses will be taught by full-time faculty. Full-time faculty all holding terminal degrees within the field of study.

The program offers a capstone option, which gives the student the option of an internship, a competency exam, and/or a thesis paper. The internship option will allow the student to be fully immersed in a professional environment in which practical work experience will be gained.

Potential majors were identified through and analysis of student enrollment projections for 2019-2020. There are currently 19 major programs offered at HSSU, and a student body of approximately 1800, with a freshman class of over one quarter of students annually. The program anticipates capturing a proportional share (5%) of graduating seniors by the second and third years, with a leveling off of part-time majors after year two.

A beginning cohort of 10 fulltime students and 2 part-time (non-cohort) students will be admitted in the fall semester. The program course work will be delivered via face-to-face, on-line, and hybrid instructions. Classes are offered weekdays, evenings, and weekends. Implementation of varied instructional delivery will ensure greater efficiency and utilization of resources including full-time and part-time faculty while assuring optimal program quality. The strategic planning process will continuously monitor the growth of the MPA program and varied resources, and planned budget will be adjusted accordingly.

The program has interdepartmental cooperation; specifically, the MBAH Program (Master's in Health Administration), which is a program offered by the College of Business. A core requirement course, PADM 0512 Human Resources Management is a cross listed course offered by the Business School as MBAH 0545 also titled Human Resources Management. Additionally, the following elective courses are dual courses offered by the business school: MBAH 0520/POSC 0517 Health Policy and Regulations from the Global Perspectives; MBA 0530/PADM 0520 Managerial Finance; MBAH 0525/PADM 0516 Legal and Ethical Aspects of Health Administration.

The program also offers interdisciplinary programs in both Criminal Justice Management and Economies: PADM 0522/CRMJ 0510 Criminal Justice Policy; PADM 0523/CRMJ 0511 Criminal Justice Management; ECON 0501 Introduction to Econometrics; and ECON 0502 Intermediate Econometrics.

Need/Demand

The Master of Public Administration is designed in accordance with the missions of the University and the School of Arts and Science, which is to address the expansion of program offerings to an underrepresented and diverse population. The program also responds to the current level of interest and demand of those who are seeking a career and a graduate degree in public management. Currently HSSU offers undergraduate degrees in Public Administration, Political Science, and Urban Studies. A total of forty-five students are declared majors in the fields. Additionally, HSSU offers an undergraduate major in Criminal Justice, with one-hundred declared majors.


The St. Louis Metropolitan region is composed of over one-hundred separate municipalities and four counties. Furthermore, state and local government agencies are headquartered in the near downtown area of St. Louis. Additionally, the three-million plus population of the region is supported by hundreds of non-profit agencies. The thousands of local, state, non-profit, and federal employees are the pool of potential students. Based on current undergraduate offerings, with a conservative estimate of a five percent acceptance rate from matriculating students from the above degree offerings and matched by an initial non-HSSU student acceptance rate the initial forecast of the first semester of the program is for a total of ten full-time students and two part-time students. Utilizing a similar forecast of

five-percent annual growth estimates the program is forecast to reach an equilibrium of twenty-five to thirty students by the fifth year of the program.

Societal Demand:

The proposed MPA at the Institution will primarily provide access to a graduate degree for the residents of the Metropolitan St. Louis area who aspire to enter the graduate field of public administration and are in need of an affordable option. There are several private institutions of higher education that offer a graduate program in public administration. However, Harris-Stowe State University is centrally located near the locus of both regional, local, federal, and state agencies with its central location near downtown St. Louis. Harris-Stowe's central location makes it the viable choice for mid-level public professionals, and the emphasis on both evening and weekend courses makes it the most viable choice for students seeking to advance both their careers and knowledge.

Graduates will be prepared for management roles in a wide variety of public fields including local, state, federal, and non-profit management. The program emphasis on policy analysis will prepare graduates for multi-faceted roles as decision makers and managers. Graduates will be able to begin or continue their public careers in management, and the social and civic benefits to the St. Louis area are countless. The program has the potential of developing a cadre of public professionals from an under-represented population, which economic and civic benefits to the area are unmeasurable.
