At present, there are RN to BSN Completion options available in the state of Missouri; however, there are no programs offered in the greater Joplin area except for a program in Pittsburg, Kansas. The proposed program is unique in offering Registered Nurses the opportunity to complete a baccalaureate degree through digital learning and a practicum in the desired area of interest. In the past, the program was offered at MSSU Nursing through a traditional face-to-face classroom environment with students integrated with traditional pre-licensure nursing students in Senior level courses. These same nurses were required to complete clinical experiences along with the prelicensure students. The proposed RN to BSN completion program is geared towards enhancing the education of this population of potential students who are currently practicing as a Registered Nurse. The program is also unique in that it is focused on innovation in healthcare, research, and use of evidence-based practice. All of which will be essential in elevating the education and training of the nursing workforce. The curriculum, when completed by the student, will properly position them for advanced degrees in nursing such as a Master's or Doctorate degree.

Program Changes for Fall 2023 Catalog COMMUNICATION MEMO

Please note this is a resubmission of the initial memo correcting First-Year Experience for the university catalog plan of study to University experience and correction of CIP major code There are no other changes aside from that issue.

The Missouri Southern State University Nursing Department proposes changes to the delivery and courses within the RN to BSN completion curriculum. The changes to the delivery and RN to BSN completion program are brought about by the 2020 traditional track curriculum changes and current educational needs of nursing professionals who hold an unencumbered Registered Nurse license. The RN to BSN completion program is proposed to be a new major code for the BSN Nursing major. The CIP code for the major is 51,3801.

The proposed University catalog inclusion and changes to the RN to BSN completion plan of study may be found at the end of this section. To summarize, the current baccalaureate curriculum is a simple to complex approach with a foundation in general education studies. The curriculum uses Tanner's Model of Clinical Judgement and Knowles's Theory on andragogy to frame the students' education with a strong emphasis on adult health across the lifespan. The proposed RN to BSN curriculum will offer working nursing professionals with an unencumbered Registered Nurse license the opportunity to complete a baccalaureate degree as this degree is the foundation for graduate studies and upward career mobility. Historically, the program provided an RN to BSN completion program in a traditional, face-to-face classroom setting with the last graduate from this program in 2019. The program curriculum is mapped to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing BSN Essentials. The AACN essentials are used to define quality in nursing education and outlines expected competencies of graduates from baccalaureate programs.

The MSSU Nursing Department preparation of the digital learning RN to BSN Nursing Completion program will consist of a curriculum revision substantive change to the national accrediting body, Accreditation Commission in Nursing Education (ACEN), after approval at the university level. The Missouri State Board of nursing (MSBN) does not have jurisdiction over RN to BSN programs. However, the MSBN will require submission and presentation of the curriculum change to both the education committee and full board due to the potential impact upon faculty and department resources in the pre-licensure programs.

A listing of student resources is provided in each of the RN to BSN course syllabi. The inclusion of technology resources such as a computer or tablet, internet access, and audiovisual capabilities (headphone/microphone)

will be required for the program. Many aspects of program assessment include writing assignments, presentations, and ePortfolio. Students will use the Microsoft Office applications as provided when entering the university. Students will use Microsoft OneNote for the creation of a portfolio of work (ePortfolio) as a platform to demonstrate attainment of learned competencies.

Practicum hours are demonstrated through two primary routes. First, the resource ShadowHealth™ offers a digital platform of standardized clinical experiences for undergraduate students to establish competencies associated with health assessment, therapeutic communication, and clinical judgement for clients in a wide variety of populations, socioeconomic backgrounds, and health problems. Students can traverse through realistic interactions with digital clients in the attainment of student learning objectives. Specific digital clinical experiences will be centered upon advanced health assessment, population health, and leadership. Forty-eight of the 96 practicum hours required for the program will be offered using digital clinical experiences. The remaining 48 hours of clinical practicum hours may be completed in the student's clinical environment of choice with an identified preceptor. Completion of onsite practicum hours will follow specific guidelines and documentation for both student and identified preceptor including signed preceptor agreements, evaluations, and reflective journals. Students will be required to submit documentation of immunization/vaccination, fingerprint criminal background check, and other healthcare site-related requirements prior to assignment at a precepted clinical site. Recommended clinical sites will include hospitals, community health settings, healthcare clinics, primary/secondary school nursing, long-term care, mental health facilities, programs of nursing (practical nursing and undergraduate), and ambulatory care settings.

The RN to BSN Completion program will offer a rolling admittance in the summer, fall, and spring. Both a full-time and part-time plan of study is offered to allow flexibility for working Registered Nurses. In addition, Prior Learning Assessment is available for general education requirements, or the student may complete these as needed in accordance with the degree audit.

Quality client care hinges on having a highly educated nursing workforce. Research has shown the lower mortality rates, fewer medication errors and quality outcomes are all linked to nurses prepared at the baccalaureate and higher degree level. The American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) supports the career ladder concept for nursing and understands that education enhances both clinical competency and client care.

To facilitate a better educated workforce, degree completion programs provide additional education to registered nurses (RNs) who received their initial nursing preparation in diploma and associate degree (ADN) programs. These bridge programs build on previous learning, prepare nurses for a higher level of nursing practice, and provide RNs with the education necessary to move forward in their nursing careers.

The following documentation outlines the previous MSSU Nursing Department RN to BSN Completion program and proposed RN to BSN Completion program. Academic Policies Committee required documents, abbreviated syllabi, and proposed curricular map are offered as addendums to this memo.

Philosophy

Current Philosophy

Concepts of person, health, environment, nursing, and education:

Person: Each person is a unique open system interacting with the environment. The person exhibits varying degrees of achievement and potential in the following areas: Physiological, psychological, sociocultural, developmental, and spiritual.

Health: Health is viewed on a continuum from wellness to illness.

Wellness is equated with optimal system stability resulting from a normal line of defense. Participation by the person is an essential element in Improvement, maintenance, and restoration of health.

Environment: The environment consists of all internal and external stressors surrounding the person. The relationship between the person and environment is reciprocal and circular in nature.

Nursing: Nursing is a caring profession in its consideration of all client system variables demonstrating a holistic care approach to client situations. The nurse is sensitive to population and cultural stressors in a rapidity changing global environment.

The nursing process is the methodology of practice and facilitates critical thinking necessary for appropriate nursing action. Primary, secondary, and tertiary interventions are used to achieve the person's optimal system stability in the presence of stressors.

Contemporary nursing is demonstrated through the roles of provider of care, client advocate, client educator, consumer of nursing research, leader, manager, and collaborator. The nurse effectively integrates communication strategies in interacting with the person and information systems. The nurse is accountable to practice within established professional standards.

Education: Education is the outcome of an individual's experiences occurring throughout the life cycle and attained through formal and informal activities. The teaching/learning process if a cooperative endeavor, is continuous and results in measurable changes in the learner's behavior.

The role of the learner is to actively participate in the educational process in order for learning to be meaningful and useful. Learning is best achieved in an environment in which the person is accepted and respected.

Baccalaureate nursing education as an integral part of the system of higher learning relies on core courses, which provide an infrastructure for developing critical thinking, decision-making, communication, values, and technologies. The role of the faculty is to guide the educational process. This process extends to the practice setting where education of the client occurs.

New Philosophy

The faculty of the Missouri Southern State University Department of Nursing believe:

Person: The person is an autonomous, unique, and multidimensional being with inherent integrity and values, capable of caring, growing, and learning. A person can be expanded to include the family or community.

Health and Illness: A person's health and illness are influenced by emotional and physical factors, socioeconomic situation, geographical setting, culture, and acuity of care.

Clinical Situation: Nursing practice is an art and a science that occurs within a clinical situation. Engagement with the client allows the nurse to notice and interpret patterns of health and illness, allowing the nurse to respond with individualized nursing interventions.

Nursing Education: General education supports development of the nurse as a global citizen with an appreciation of art, natural sciences, social sciences, and humanities. Baccalaureate nursing education prepares the graduate nurse through theoretical and clinical education in diverse settings and provides the basis for advanced practice.

Clinical Judgement: Clinical judgment requires the ability to recognize aspects of a clinical situation, interpret the meaning and respond appropriately.

Nurse: The nurse enters the clinical situation with life and educational experiences, which are foundational to clinical judgement and provision of inclusive client care. The nurse's vision of holistic care stems from knowing and recognizing the client's unique patterns of responses within the clinical situation.
