#### A. Market Demand:

i. National, state, regional, or local assessment of labor need for citizens with these skills Events in the past decade, nationally and globally, have increased the professionalization of crisis response, particularly through FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security and thereby increased the demand for people educated in the field. The Bureau of Labor Statistics expects employment to grow in emergency management by 22% by 2018, and indicates that four of the top five states in concentration of jobs in the field are in the Great Plains region. (BLS Occupational Employment Statistics, www.bls.gov/oes/currentloes131061.htm. May 2010). Local governments provide the greatest level of employment in the field. The FEMA National Preparedness Directorate provides extensive documentation of the need for professional training and provides surveys that indicate significant growth in demand in the field. A FEMA-sponsored survey of institutions by Dr. Carol Cwiak, concludes from data provided by institutions currently offering degrees that the field is currently at a "tipping" point of tremendous growth of awareness and demand for bachelors degrees in the field.

The goals of the program include preparing citizens to serve in crisis response who might not be otherwise directly employed in the field. The degree program will assist with correlative training and development Campus-Community Emergency Response Teams as well as coordination with community emergency responders from a variety of agencies. Students and faculty working with the program will also assist regional public school districts with emergency response plans, as indicated by these same activities in conjunction with our minor degree program in Crisis Response. Re: Rationale to delete Statistics Majors

The purpose of this letter is to provide our institution's rationale for deleting the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science majors in Statistics. In September 2010 the Coordinating Board of Higher Education directed MDHE to review program productivity for all degree programs at all 4-year public institutions based on graduation rates.

Several programs at Northwest Missouri State University were identified as being below the productivity threshold laid out in CBHE policy. Institutions were given options of identifying mitigating factors or extenuating circumstances to continue such programs, or to outline plans to delete it. In the case of these majors, based on low enrollment and graduation rates, we have decided to delete both the BA-Statistics and BS-Statistics programs. Beginning in Fall 2011 new students were not admitted into these majors and the remaining students will be handled on teach-out plans.

Re: Rationale to delete Restaurant and Food Service Management Option

The purpose of this letter is to provide our institution's rationale for deleting the Option II - Restaurant and Food Service Management comprehensive major option from the comprehensive major in Foods and Nutrition. In September 2010 the Coordinating Board of Higher Education directed MDHE to review program productivity for all degree programs at all 4-year public institutions based on graduation rates.

Several programs at Northwest Missouri State University were identified as being below the productivity threshold laid out in CBHE policy. Institutions were given options of identifying mitigating factors or extenuating circumstances to continue such programs, or to outline plans to delete it. In the case of this degree option, based on low enrollment and graduation rates, we have decided to delete this program. Beginning in Fall 2011 new students were not admitted into this major and the remaining students will be handled on a teach-out plan.
